- No activity can be legal if it poses a risk to even one person's life. The truth is that the
 extended construction will put to risk the lives of hundreds of thousands of people
 living in and around Dwarka. Thus, extended construction is an illegal activity.
- Even if the majority of the members in a group housing society agree for extended construction, their decision cannot be accepted because it will endanger the health and lives of others.
- The Article 21 of Indian Constitution assures the citizens of India the right to a healthy, pollution-free environment.
- The National Green Tribunal (NGT) of India has observed that one of the major sources of air pollution is dust emission from construction activities, which must be stopped to avoid pollution-related diseases and deaths.
- With these facts, we the residents of Dwarka in New Delhi request the government to save us from the dust and noise pollution in group housing societies so that we could live in a clean, pollution-free environment.
- The government should not allow any such building extension projects as they
 are going to be hazardous to human health and lives.
